However, the wearing of face masks will be encouraged indoors. However, it is the attendee's choice, and they are free to not wear a mask if they choose. Mingling is now allowed and keeping 2m from others is no longer required. However, recognising that not everyone will be comfortable with this, there will be a zone on one side of the church where keeping 2m from others is still expected. There will also be orange stickers available for people to wear to let others know they would like to maintain social distancing. 	children and vulnerable people. How: Close contact with others. Contact with contaminated surfaces and then touching eyes/nose/mouth.	distancing is no longer required. However, half of the church will be set up to allow people to choose to keep social distancing if they wish. Attendees are still asked to minimise touching surfaces. The congregational singing is now allowed. Singing will continue to be led by a group of singers at the front. There will be no collection taken during the service. Online giving will be encouraged where possible. A collection box will be available on the way out. When live streaming the service, although social distancing no longer required, we will try to only have one person using the laptop and set up the live stream - this is due to the small space around the PA equipment and the potential for contact with equipment which has been touched by others. Tea and Coffee will happen after the service. Disposable cups will continue to be used to prevent people having to wash up in the kitchen. Bibles are now to be used in the pews. There are enough for one per person and they are used once a week. There is no restriction on the number of people

Sunday Club will meet in the hall. The children's corner will continue to not be available, however, this will be reviewed. Parents of small children are now able to take younger children into the hall if they wish. Parents will be encouraged to ask their children to adhere to the same hand hygiene and social distancing practices.
Toilets and Cleaning		

Toilets; Potential for contracting COVID-19	Who: Church staff, congregation and visitors, including children and vulnerable people. How: Close contact with others. Contact with contaminated surfaces and then touching eyes/nose/mouth.	 One person in a toilet at a time. Encourage thorough hand washing (posters in place) Outer door of toilets to be secured open to avoid the need to touch it after washing hands. Toilets cleaned on Sunday afternoons. Bins containing potentially contaminated waste (in toilets as well as other parts of the church) should have liners which can be tied off at the end of a service. Prior to the church next opening (48 hours later) these can be taken out and put in a refuse sack. Hand sanitiser available at the entrance to the toilets. Soap and paper towels are available with handwash sinks in the toilets. Outer doors are held open to avoid the need for touching them and increase ventilation.
Cleaning; Potential for contracting COVID-19	Who: Church staff, congregation and visitors, including children and vulnerable people. Cleaners How: Contact with contaminated surfaces and then touching eyes/nose/mouth.	This takes place routinely on a Thursday morning or as need.
Emergencies		

Fire; Potential for contracting COVID-19	Who: Church staff, congregation and visitors, including children and vulnerable people.	 Existing emergency procedures for fire remain in place. When evacuating and waiting at the assembly point, social distancing should be maintained as far as possible, but in line with government guidance, social distancing can be relaxed in an emergency. Communicated via email, website and YouTube channel. Welcome team have been briefed to provide this guidance in an emergency
COVID-19 Case	Who: Church staff, congregation and visitors, including children and vulnerable people.	 Attendees have been asked to let the church office know if they develop symptoms or receive a positive test result within a week of attending a service. When the church office has been informed of a suspected or confirmed case of COVID-19 in someone who attended church, if the church will not be closed for 48hrs between their attendance of church and the next use, clean. If someone develops COVID-19 symptoms at church, they should go home immediately if they are well enough. Surfaces they have touched or have breathed/coughed on should be disinfected as soon as practical to avoid others touching those areas. Cleaning supplies are available for the welcome team to use if required.
Medical Emergency; Potential for contracting COVID-19	Who: Those assisting/giving first aid, and the person they are helping.	 Those providing first aid will wear PPE (gloves, face mask) and wash their hands thoroughly afterwards. PPE is stored near the first aid kit. CPR: recommended to perform chest compressions only.
